Music at Green Lane School is practical and fun. In order to promote engagement for learning music and enjoyment of music is an everyday part of school life. Social skills are promoted through active listening activities, working together to make music, responding to the work of others, and joining in with music lunchtime clubs and whole school events such as Christmas carol concerts. Pupils will enhance their communication by learning the technical vocabulary associated with music, how music is structured, its dynamics, and develop their understanding of pitch and rhythm.

Challenge is provided through a range of progressive musical activities, including theoretical and practical aspects of music. Pupils engage with a range of activities that support in increasing pupils' independence and confidence. These elements combine to teach appropriate behaviour; how to use instruments appropriately, how to work as an ensemble, how to listen and respond to the work of others. Musical enhancements are planned for across key stages and include Livemusicnow! Taiko drumming and external singers and groups.

Music in lower school is based on the Charagna scheme of work. This is then adapted to ensure that knowledge and skills within a unit of work are tailored to pupils age related attainment levels.
